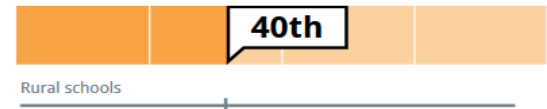

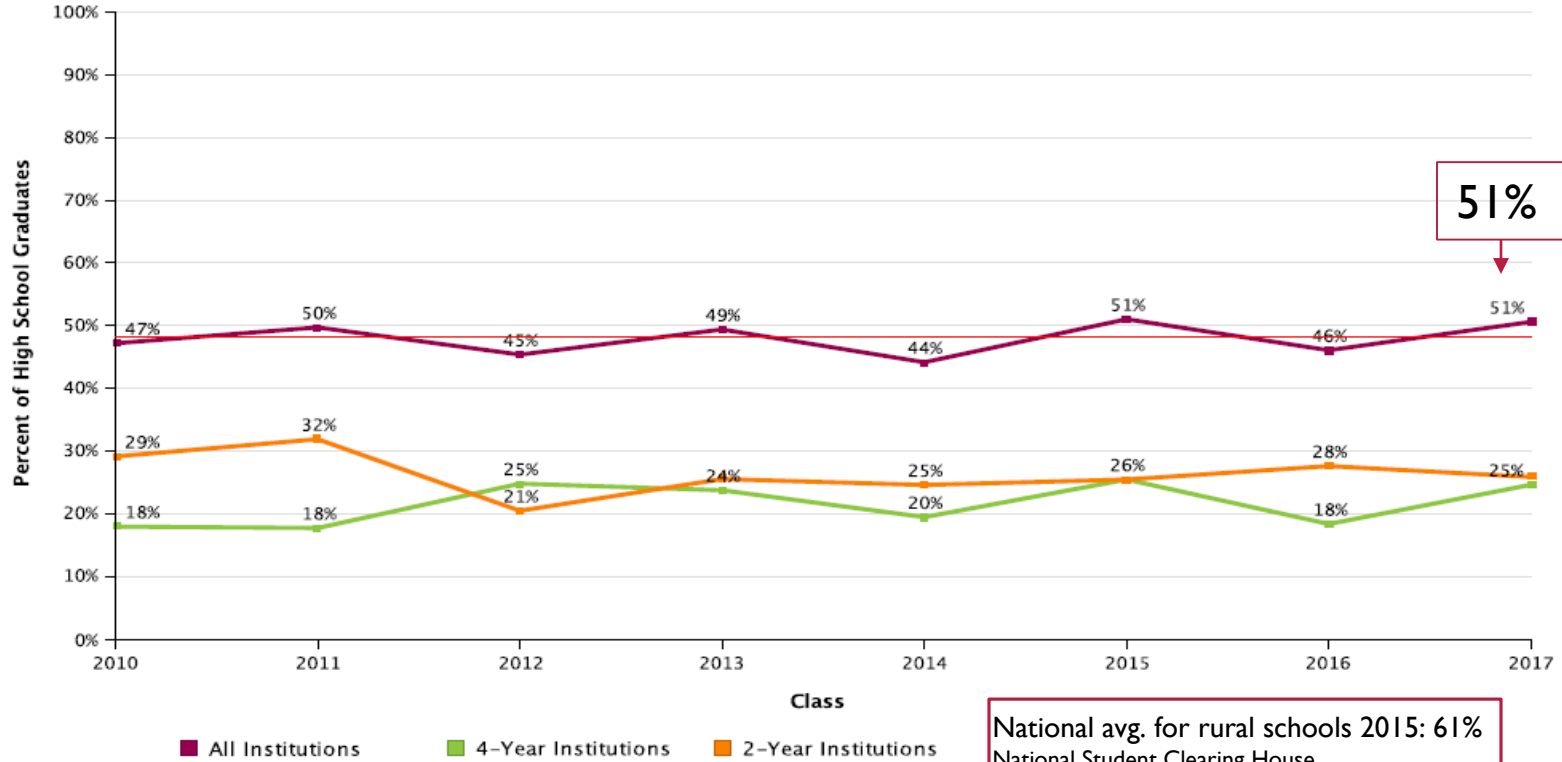

Percent of Graduates Enrolled in College the Fall Immediately After HS Graduation

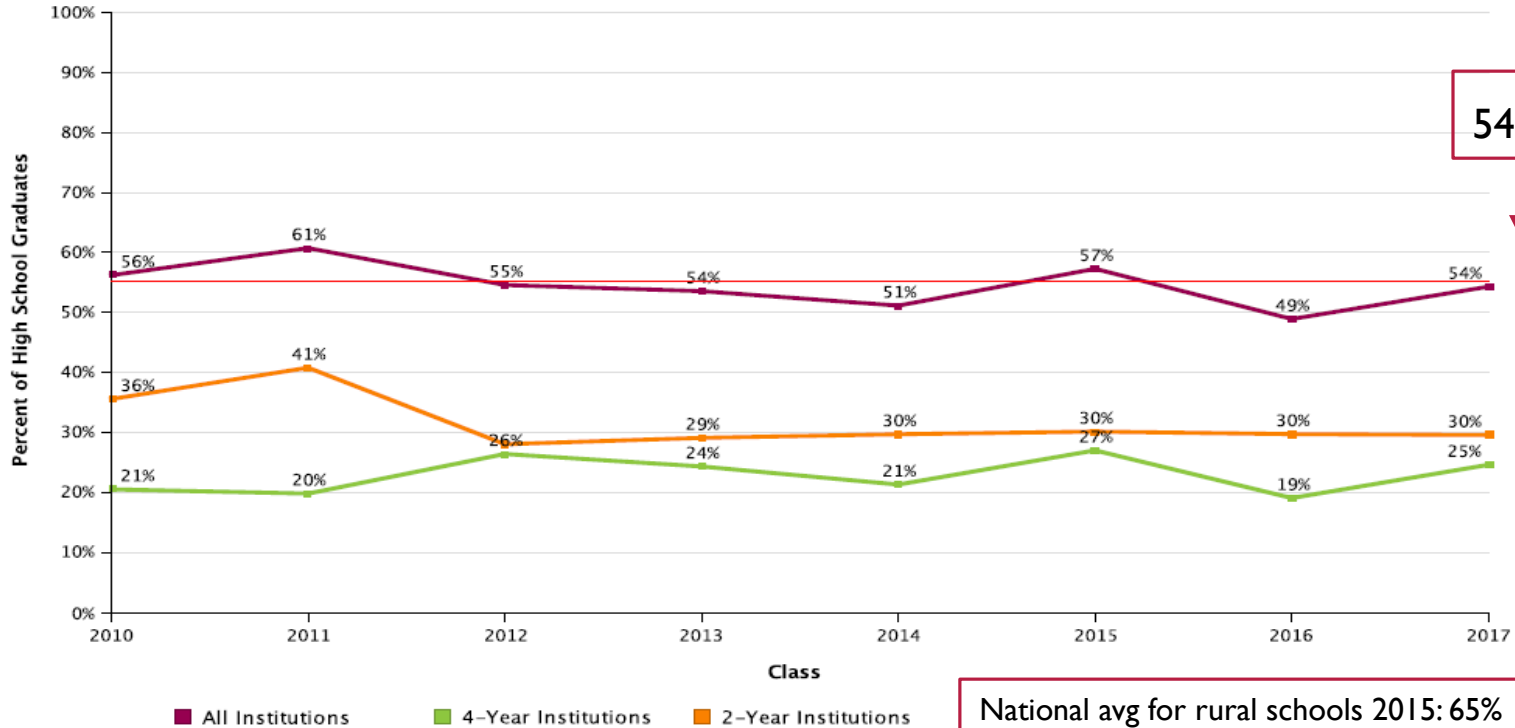
Percent of Students Enrolled in College the Fall Immediately After High School by Institutional Level

Percent of Students Enrolled in College at Any Time During the First Year After High School by Institutional Level

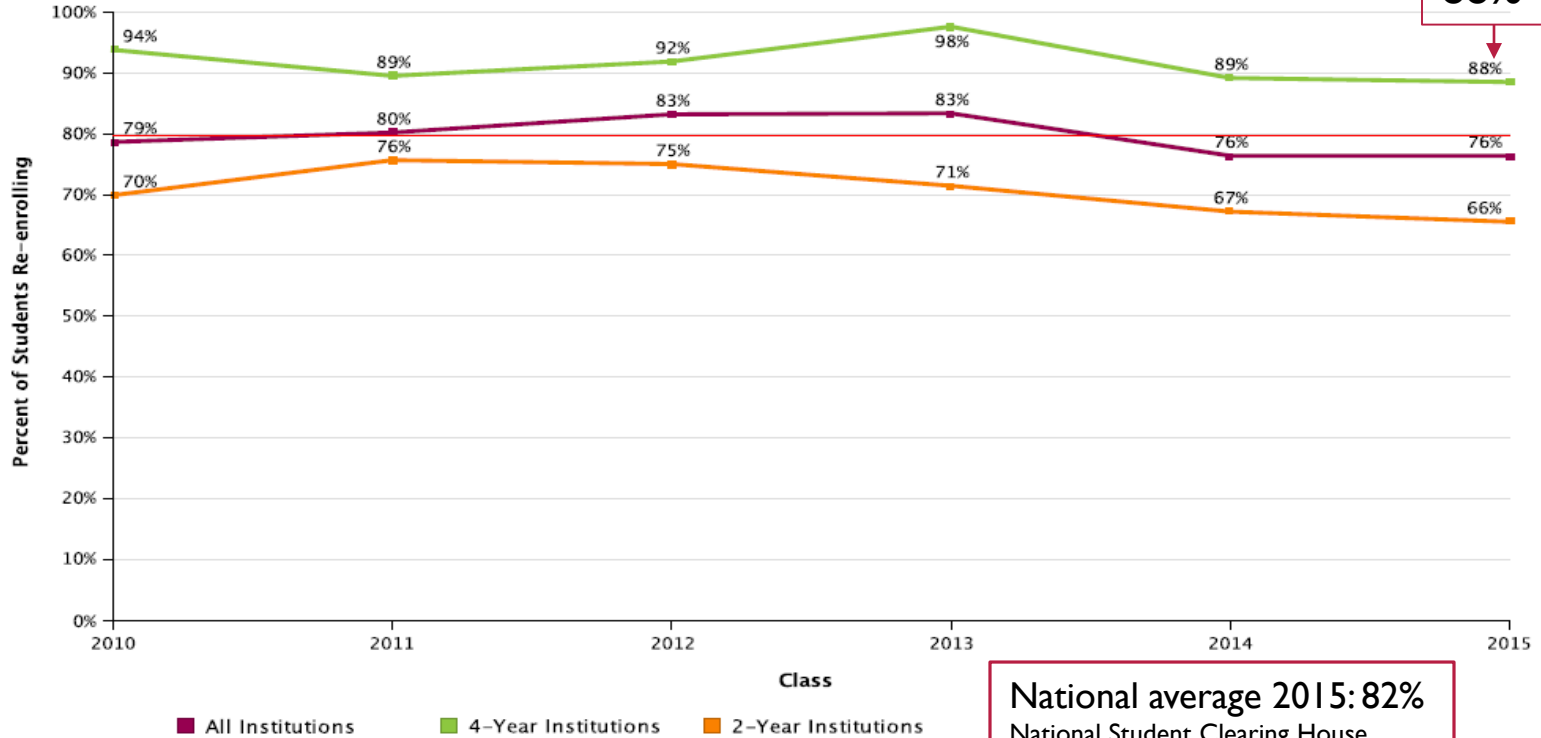

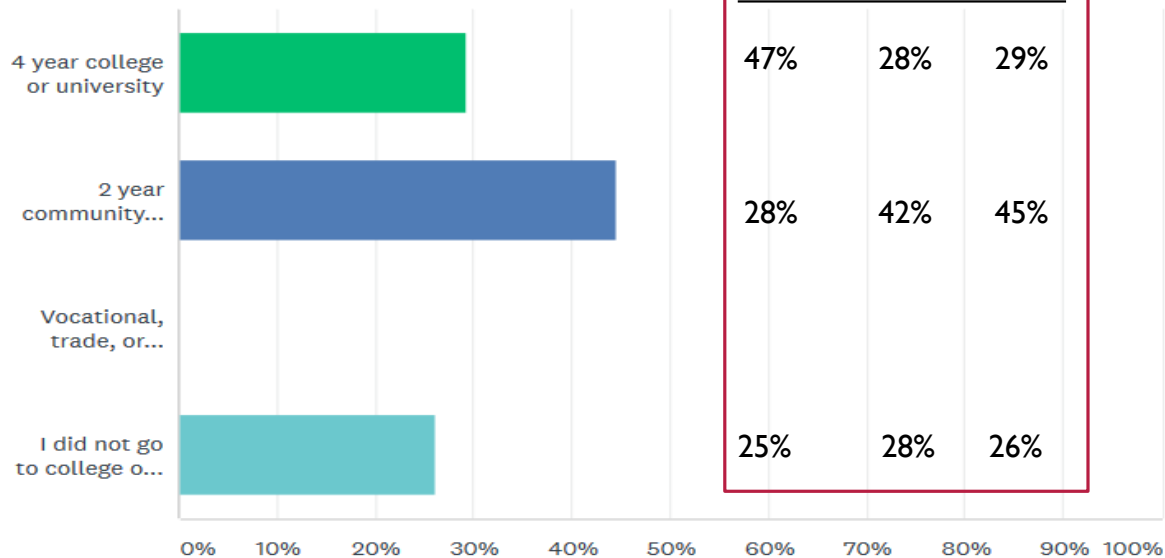

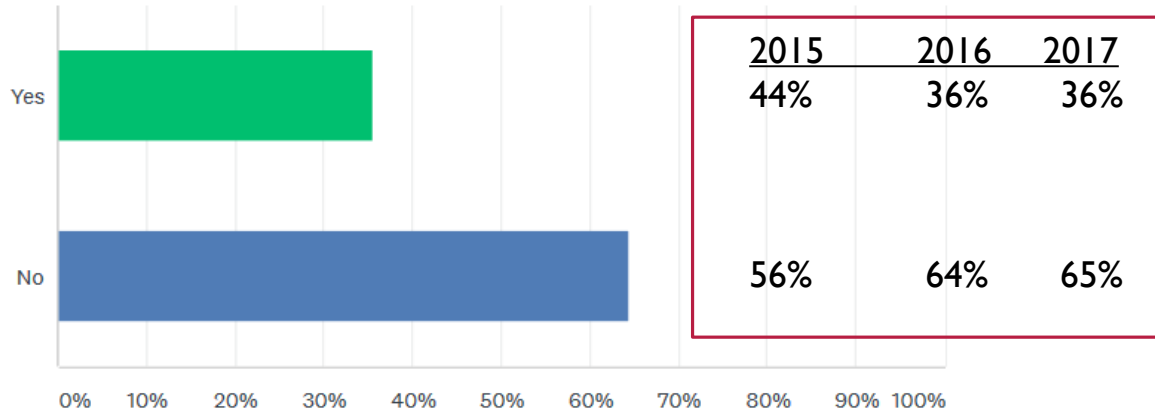

When you started college were you required to take any remedial (placement) classes such as Math or English before taking regular classes?

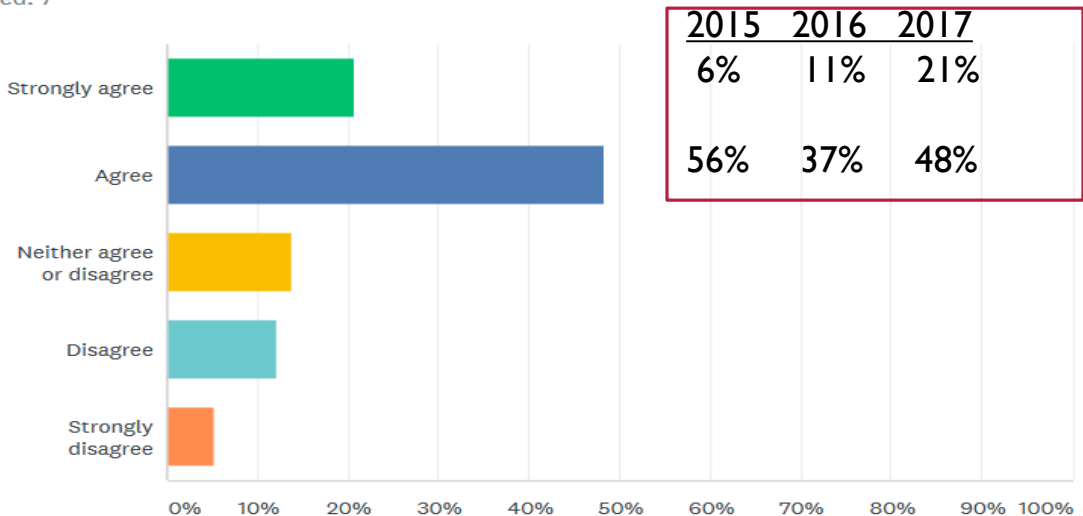

Strengths

- 91% feel welcome when they enter the school
- 85% feel knowledgeable about what is going on at the school
- 79% have been invited to participate in school planning meetings
- 94% believe that when the school communicates with them, it is easy to understand
- 88% feel their calls, emails, and notes are answered promptly
- 81% feel their child(ren) receive extra academic help when needed
- 81% believe the school is a safe place to learn
- 87% believes their child(ren)'s school respects all cultures and diversity

Challenges

- 61% feel the schools ask for input on how their child(ren) learns
- 67% feel that parents are involved in decision making at the schools
- 35% attend decision making meetings (SSC, LCAP, ELAC, DELAC)
- 58% receive information on how to help their child at home
- 56% feel they are invited to meetings and that their voice matters
- 38% feel they have been asked to share what they appreciate about their child(ren)'s school
